When it arrived, discovered the patterns were already in the The Unofficial Harry Potter Knits Magazine (2013). I wouldn't have minded if this had been made clear in the description but it was NOT. And the patterns themselves now have different names. For ex. the blue capelet on the cover here is called Ghostly Cloak. in HP Knits: The Grey Lady's Cloak (as in Helena Ravenclaw). "Thinking Cap" = "Dumbledore's Smoking Hat". "Giant's Sweater" = "Hagrid's Sweater." "Inverse Socks" = "Fred and George's Socks". "A Cap Full of Caps" = "E.L.F. Cap". "Owl Cardigan" = "Ginny's Cardigan". "Griffin Socks" = "Dragon's Egg Socks" (From 'The Goblet of Fire'). "Enchanted Forest Scarf" - "Forbidden Forest Scarf" (which borders Hogwart's). "Rich Earth Mitts" = "Pomona's Mitts (as in Professor Pomona Sprout). "Shimmering Cloak" = "Ignotus Peverell's Cloak" (IE 'The Cloak of

Invisibility). "Midnight Mitts" = "Sword of Gryffindor Mitts" (Seriously??!!! that's a major hide!) as well as "Rendez-Vouz Mitts" - "Hermione's Time Turner Mitts" (they even have the letter "H"!!!) "Blue Moon Shawl" = "Bluebell Flames Shawl" (as in the blue flames Hermione magicked up in "Sorcerer's Stone"). "Cotillion Arm Warmers" = "Yule Ball Engageantes" (From "The Goblet of Fire"). "Inky Pullover" - "Severus Pullover" (Really?). "Lady of the House Wrapper" = "Malfoy Manor Wrapper". "Chameleon Wrapper" = "Tonk's Togs" (as in "Nymphadora Tonk" from "The Deathly Hallows Pt.1") "Aviary Vest" = "Order of the Phoenix Winged Vest" (sigh....). "Lacy Cloak" = "Lestrage Cloak" as in Bellatrix Lestrage). Yes.... I feel like a complete idiot for paying money for this then waiting for it. Goodness knows, I already had it. At times I am let down by the patterns and projects that are in a book especially when not all patterns can be seen before you buy a book. Out of the 27 projects I will be knitting at least 10 of them in the future, and for me that is well worth the cost of this book. The theme was of no interest to me only the patterns but the book is well put together and the Sorcery Sweater is the first project on my list to do for my husband. (men's sweaters are so hard to find and this one is great) The pattern instructions are easy to read and follow so far, I have only been knitting for 3 years I can cable, follow written-out directions and also read charts. In my opinion this is not a beginner book but you do not have to be an expert either to be able to put this wonderful book to use. By Mr Matthew E Palmer Most of the patterns in this book were previously printed in the Charmed Knits book but clearly they had some copy right issues as this book has clear allusions in the print and photography to Harry Potter but no overt references. Nice clear patterns but there is a total excess of gloves and wrist-lets... who want to knit 4 different wrist-lets (several have little finger loops intended to look elegant but just look stupid). However, there are a few patterns in this book that make it sooooo worth buying as they are not available on Ravelry separately. One is the Drop Your Gaurd Vest! Adorable.
